CHAPERONE INFORMATION

Welcome!

Penn Museum's sleepover program, *40 Winks with the Sphinx*, invites guests to an overnight "expedition" of the Museum. The night's activities are geared to take intrepid explorers on a journey through time and across continents, with hands-on opportunities, through games, crafts, and more! You and your group can decide which activities to participate in and which exhibits to explore! Remember, general admission for the Museum is included for the next day. Certain Special Exhibitions that require a separate fee are not included.

Chaperone Responsibilities

Children must be chaperoned at all times. Each group will be required to maintain a ratio of one adult supervisor per five child participants. The event can accommodate 175 people. Please notify a sleepover staff member if anyone in your group gets sick or hurt. Smoking is prohibited in the museum. There is a designated smoking area outside the Kress Entrance. No alcohol is permitted. Violators will be asked to leave.

CHAPERONE INFORMATION

Sleeping Site

All guests will sleep in Penn Museum's Egypt (Sphinx) Gallery, which is home to a twelve ton Red Granite Sphinx. Beds may not be made in front of or in doorways. Pathways in designated sleeping area must be kept clear. Inflatable air mattresses are not permitted. Camping pads, yoga mats, and/or extra blankets are suggested. Please cooperate with staff to make sure your site is set-up safely.

Emergencies / Security

Trained security officers will remain at the Kress Entrance Desk as well as staged throughout the museum 24 hours a day. Penn Museum follows emergency and fire procedures approved by the Philadelphia Fire Marshal. Penn Museum is not responsible for lost or missing items.

40 Winks Patches

Every child participant will receive a *40 Winks with the Sphinx* collectable patch as a souvenir. Patches can be picked up outside of the Museum Pyramid Shop 7:00-9:00 am the morning of your sleepover. Participants ages 6-12 can use their patch for unlimited free admission for return visits to Penn Museum during the same school year! Patches cannot be used when attending with organized groups or for Special Exhibitions with an additional fee.

Arrival / Departure

Arrival

40 Winks with the Sphinx begins with registration from 5:30-6:30 pm. Please enter at the Kress Entrance (East side of the building) to check in with your sleepover equipment. All sleeping equipment will be placed in the Egypt (Sphinx) Gallery upon check-in and remain there throughout the sleepover. Snacks should be labeled with names and placed in Group Dining when you arrive.

Arriving Late / Leaving Early

It is important that you try and arrive at the scheduled registration time of between 5:30 and 6:30 pm. If you find you must arrive late, the Kress Entrance will remain open until 7:30 pm. No one will be admitted to participate in the sleepover after 7:30 pm. Penn Museum is located within the Philadelphia city limits, that being said please incorporate city traffic into your travel time.

Departure

40 Winks ends at 9:00 am the next morning at which point all personal belongings must be removed from the Museum. General Admission for the Museum is included the next day and re-entry will be allowed once belongings are stored outside. The Museum opens at 10:00 am to the general public.

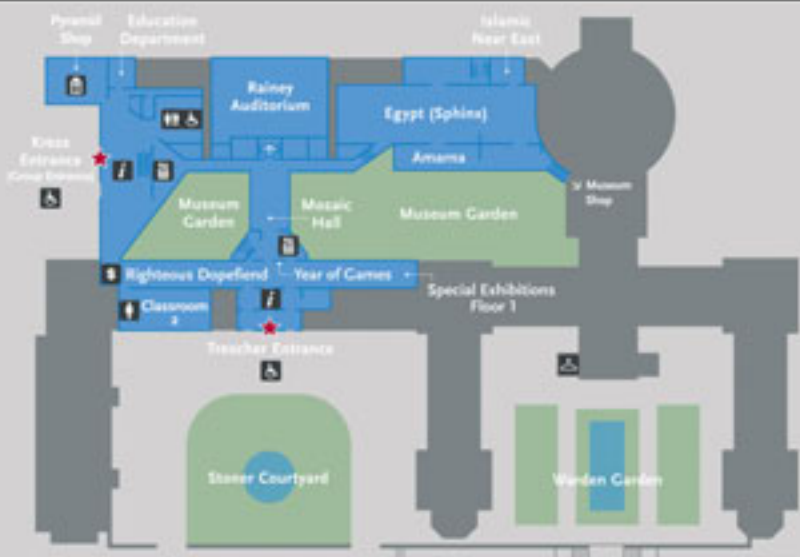

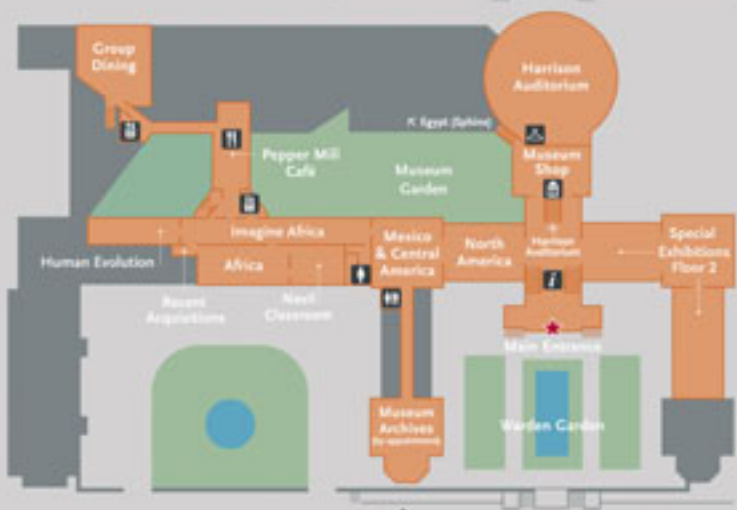


MUSEUM MAP

First Floor

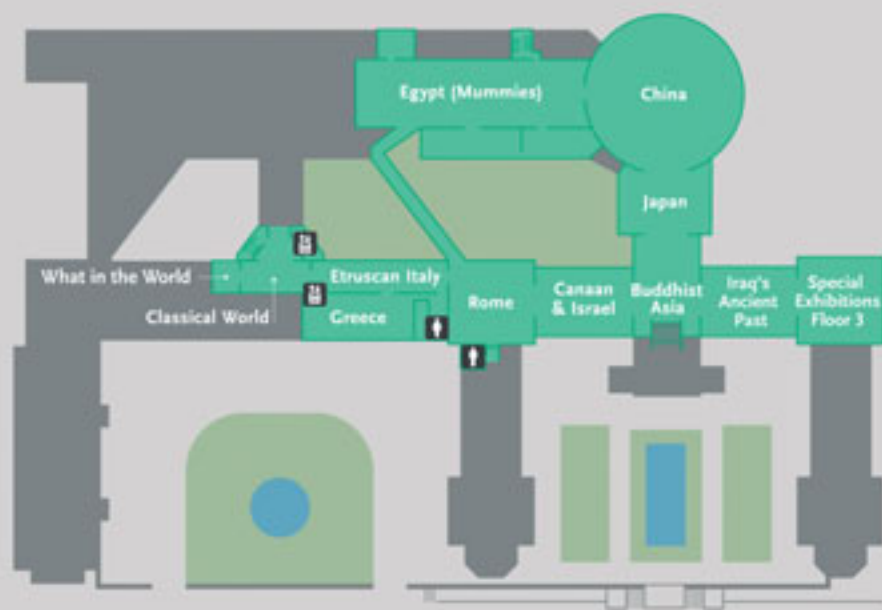


Second Floor

Exhibit Spotlight

What in the World

What in the World is an interactive installation created by multi-disciplinary artist Pablo Helguera as part of the Philagrafika contemporary art festival. The interactive exhibition is based on the popular 1950s TV show "What in the World?" On each program, four or five unidentified objects were presented to a panel of experts who were asked to guess what each piece was, where it came from, how old it was, and how it was used. Now showing on the third floor.

How do you imagine Africa? Do you see it as the home of powerful nations? Do you think of intricately carved masks or fine art? Maybe you're interested in the peoples living in Africa today.

Imagine Africa with the Penn Museum is a twelve-month gallery project investigating your thoughts. Visitors will see a small selection from the Penn Museum's extraordinary African collection, and will be asked for their feedback on what they see. Community groups will be invited to give us more detailed feedback. In this way, we will form a picture of what most visitors want to know about the vast continent of Africa. With this feedback, the museum will plan a re-installation of the African collection, informed by academic and community perspectives. Now showing on the second floor.

Code of Conduct

- * One chaperone is required for every five children, and must stay with them at all times.
- * Chaperones are responsible for the behavior of their group throughout their stay at *40 Winks with the Sphinx*. Children are not permitted to play on stairways or elevators and are expected to be respectful to others.
- * Please do not touch or place anything on the artifacts or cases.
- * Please do not run or yell while in the Museum.
- * No food or drink is allowed outside the Group Dining area.
- * Please do not go to floors or galleries that are off-limits during the Sleepover; follow your schedule.
- * Shirts and shoes or slippers must be worn throughout the evening. No Heelys are allowed.
- * After *Lights Out* chaperones are responsible for keeping their children in their designated sleep area.
- * After *Lights Out* cell phones should be put on vibrate.
- * Alcohol is not allowed on the premises during Sleepovers.
- * Proper sleeping attire is mandatory.

To make everyone's evening an enjoyable one, we ask that everyone adhere to the listed guidelines during their Sleepover.
